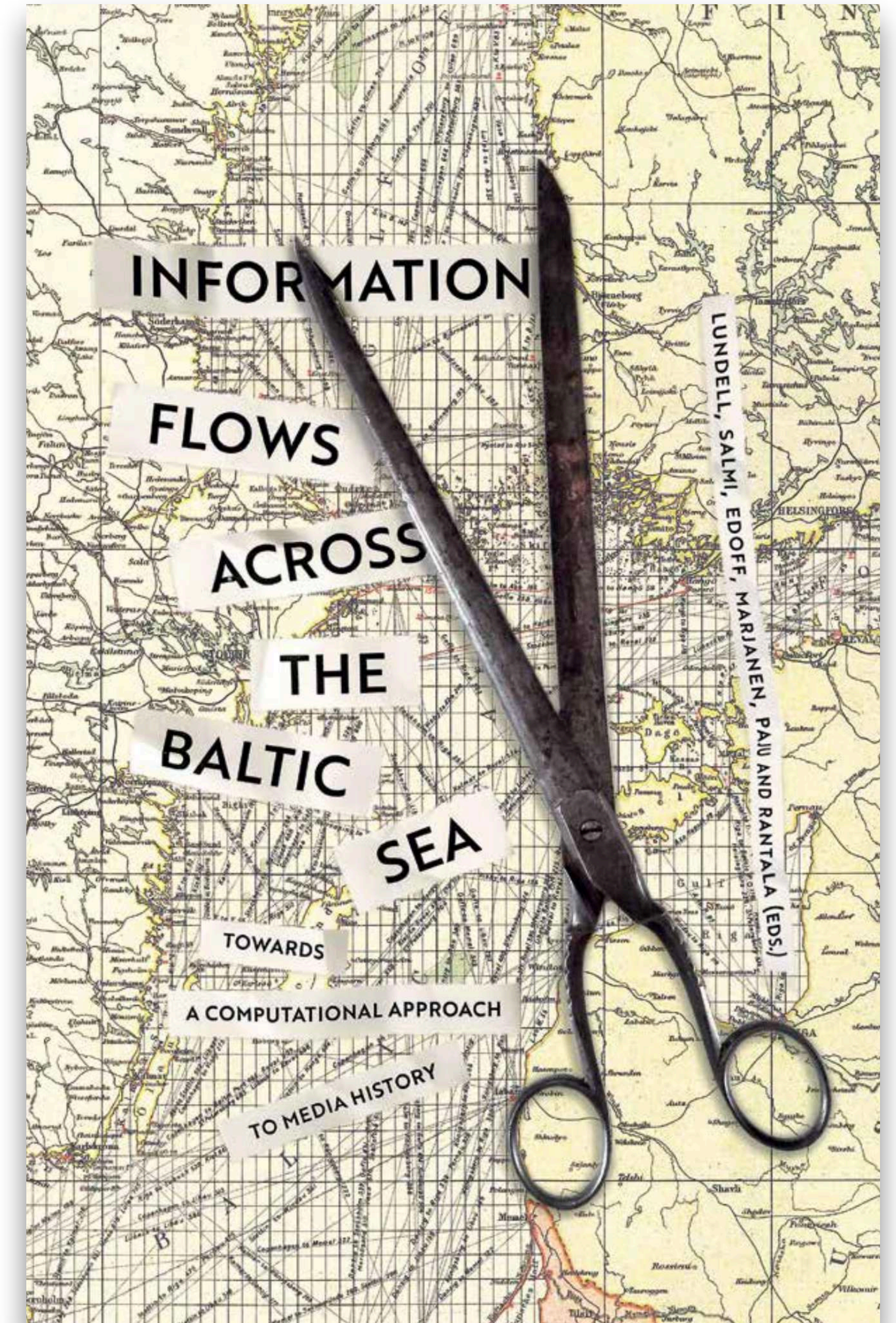
● Figure 1. Text reuse clusters on wax cabinets, based on the starting year.

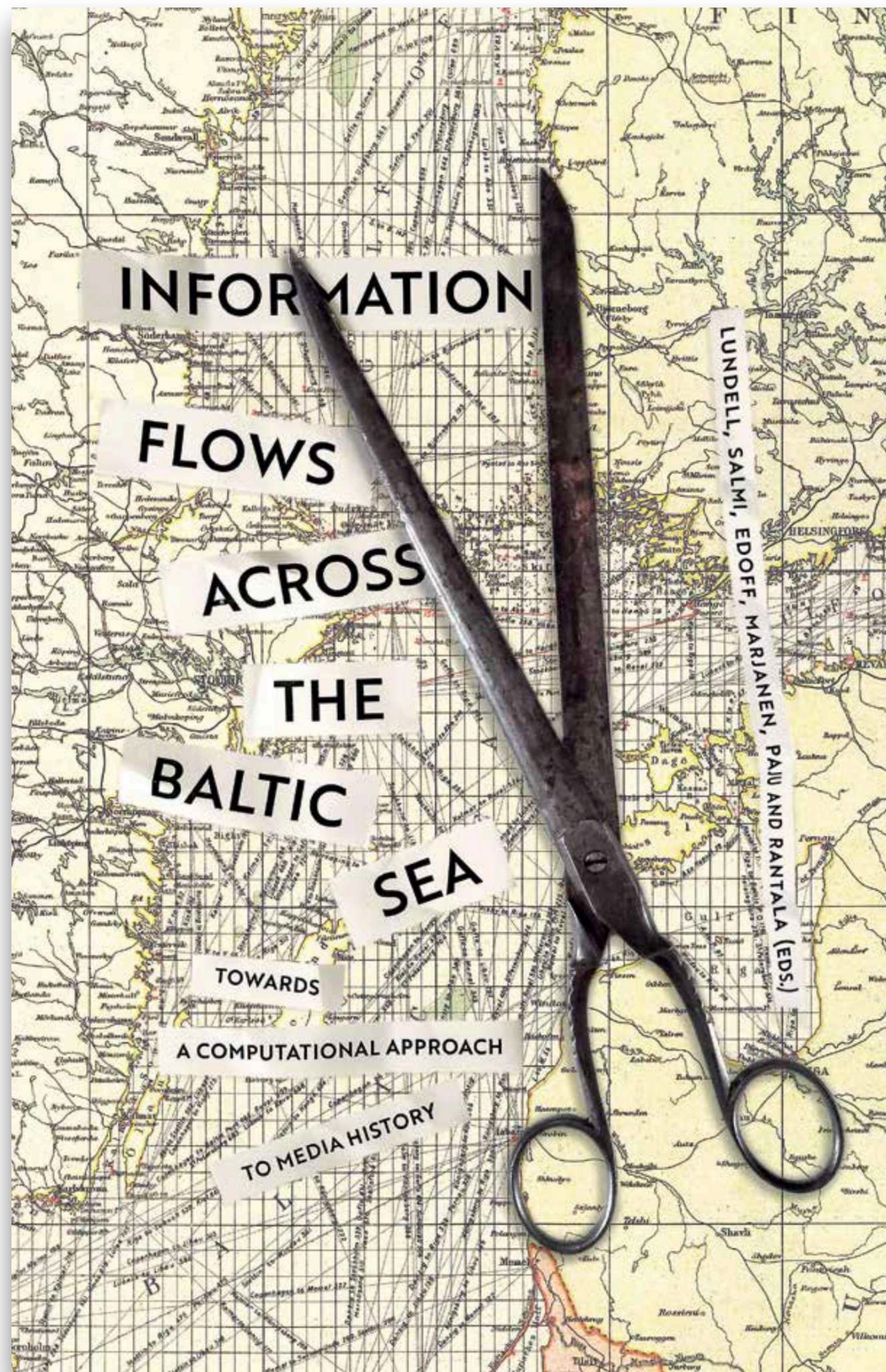

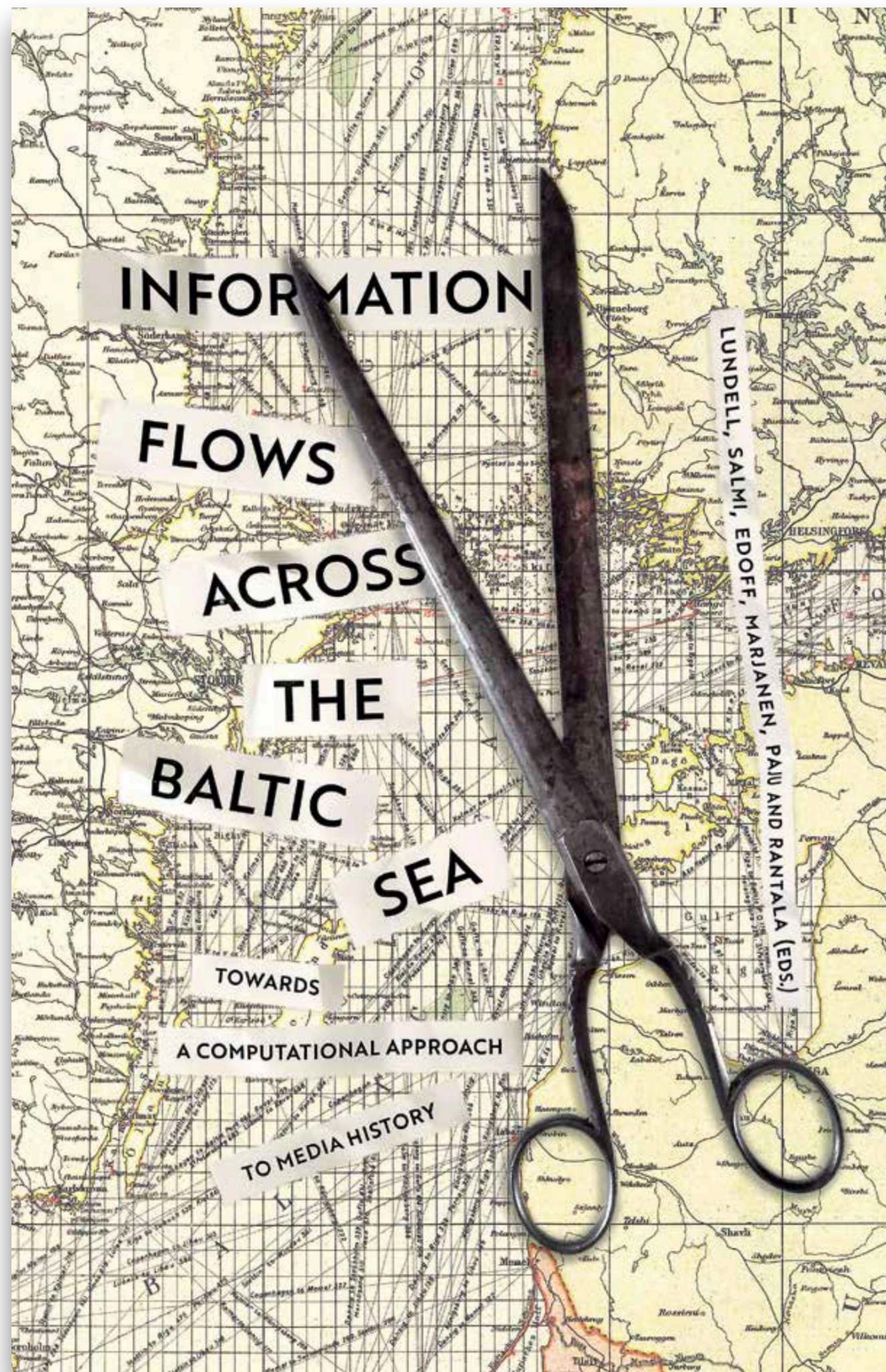

Before the era of the modern information networks enabled by the telegraph and the effective use of steam power, the speed of information travel was heavily dependent on the forces of nature: for example, favourable winds and the muscle power of horses and humans.

There is no situation better adapted for a house of accommodation; but a place more poverty-struck, dirty, cold, or in all respects more wretched, can hardly be conceived. It stands upon a rock, close to the mouth of the *Gulph of Bothniã*. The country around it is low, barren, and full of rocks, with here and there a few stunted trees and shrubs. We were detained at this miserable place, owing to the violence of the wind, which was now stormy.

DIGITAL ARCHIVAL LITERACY FOR (ALL) HISTORIANS*

Helle Strandgaard Jensen 

For centuries, understanding archives has been key to historians' work. Within the last decades, the increasing availability of sources in digital archives has fostered a growing need to understand how the logics of these influence historical research. Because, even if the digital representations of the individual sources might appear similar to those in analogue archives, using digital archives impacts the work of historians in new ways. In this article, I offer an outline for a digital archival literacy which supports a professional reflection on the everyday uses of digital archives. I propose seeing the shift from analogue to digital archives as a shift in medium, which establishes a new set of logics for the archival production, content, distribution and use. The framework draws upon notions of media literacy developed within the British Cultural Studies tradition.

In recent decades, digitisation of analogue collections has been high on the agenda in archival institutions in affluent parts of the world. Prompted by the easy availability of millions of new sources online scholars have begun to consider what this means to historical research.¹ However, most discussions have focused on changing research practices rather than the digital archives themselves and the cyberinfrastructure in which they are embedded.² The focus on end-users' practices downplays the influence economic, technical and political aspects have on the possible uses of digital archives. However, these are just as important as scholarly practices as they impact the availability, knowledge organisation and accessibility of digital archives.

In this article, I argue why historians, no matter if their subfield, needs to be able to question the economics, policies and systems design of digital archives. To that end, I offer a framework for supporting a professional reflection on the 'everyday use' of digital archives and the powerful forces that shape online content and availability. The framework draws upon Stuart Hall's encoding/decoding model.³ Hall's model sets out the parameters for a critical exploration of how the production, distribution and circulation of media (in this case, digital archives) influence signifying practices

I forskningsprojektet "Välfärdsstaten analyserad" (1945–1989) arbetar vi med olika typer av algoritmisk textanalys av storskalig empiri från politikens sfär (digitaliserat riksdagsstryck och statliga offentliga utredningar under perioden), dagspress och skönlitteratur. Svensk efterkrigstid är en väl utforskad period, men genom att applicera digitala metoder på kurerade dataset kan politikens, nyhetsmediernas och kulturens sfärer granskas på nytt. I artikeln presenteras vår digitala historieforskning, men fokus ligger främst på erfarenheter och reflektioner kring det praktiska hantverket med att arbeta med storskalig empiri, på iordningställande av dataset och datakurering, samt de möjligheter och tillkortakommanden som sådana forskningspraktiker inbegriper.

"Empiri är datainsamling genom vetenskapliga undersökningar av verkligheten", kan man läsa på Wikipedia. Men hur är egentligen begrepp som empiri och data relaterade? Det är förstås en omtvistad fråga. Men den kan undersökas empiriskt – exempelvis genom att studera versionshistoriken av artikelposten om just empiri på Wikipedia. "Empiri är vetenskapliga undersökningar av verkligheten", hette det i den första artikelversionen från 2002. Några år senare hade den inledande mening- en ändrats till: "Empiri innebär när människan bygger en slutsats utav våra sinnen", en något ålderdomlig formulering, men inte uppseende- väckande eftersom svenskt innehåll på Wikipedia ibland baserar sig på

Upscaling Swedish Biograph

ABSTRACT

Following a boom of user-friendly artificial intelligence tools in recent years, AI-enhanced (or manipulated) films have been framed as a serious threat to film archives. The purpose of this article is to trace and critically evaluate how AI artists use algorithmic upscaling to modify early cinema, more particularly surviving films of the film company Swedish Biograph, and how fragments of this company’s cinematic past circulate online today.

Appropriation, remix and reuse of old footage is a well-known practice in both film and TV history as well as today on digital platforms. Online, each media asset becomes, ‘at the instant of its release, an archive to be plundered, an original to be memorized, copied, and manipulated’, media scholar Abigail de Kosnik argues in her book *Rogue Archives* (2016: 4). Such contemporary reuse, however, has a long media history. In 1964, for example, Swedish public service broadcaster Radio Sweden bought most of the old newsreels from the production company Svensk Filmindustri (SF). Dating from 1897 to 1960, the SF archive’s 1 million metres of film promised extensive reuse and an array of forthcoming TV programmes (Eriksson et al. 2022). Among the material were some fifteen film fragments from 1911, produced by Svenska Biografteatern (Swedish Biograph), the film company that preceded SF.

Abstract

Purpose – The purpose of this paper is to explore and analyze the digitized newspaper collection at the National Library of Sweden, focusing on cultural heritage as digital noise. In what specific ways are newspapers transformed in the digitization process? If the digitized document is not the same as the source document – is it still a historical record, or is it transformed into something else?

Design/methodology/approach – The authors have analyzed the XML files from *Aftonbladet* 1830 to 1862. The most frequent newspaper words not matching a high-quality references corpus were selected to zoom in on the noisiest part of the paper. The variety of the interpretations generated by optical character recognition (OCR) was examined, as well as texts generated by auto-segmentation. The authors have made a limited ethnographic study of the digitization process.

Findings – The research shows that the digital collection of *Aftonbladet* contains extreme amounts of noise: millions of misinterpreted words generated by OCR, and millions of texts re-edited by the auto-segmentation tool. How the tools work is mostly unknown to the staff involved in the digitization process? Sticking to any idea of a provenance chain is hence impossible, since many steps have been outsourced to unknown factors affecting the source document.

Originality/value – The detail examination of digitally transformed newspapers is valuable to scholars depending on newspaper databases in their research. The paper also highlights the fact that libraries outsourcing digitization processes run the risk of losing control over the quality of their collections.

Introduction

In October 1847, the telegraphic wire in St Germain outside of Paris was struck by lightning. The Swedish newspaper *Aftonbladet* reported that a telegraph assistant at a station nearby had discovered the demolished telegraph printing several letters on its own. Yet, according to the paper, “since they were not coherent, he decided to signal the phrase used for ‘I do not understand.’” In doing so, however, he received “a heavy electric shock, which was followed by a loud bang, sounding like a gunshot” (*Aftonbladet*, 1847).

Within a digitization project initiated by the National Library of Sweden, the 1847 October copy of *Aftonbladet* was digitized in 2013 at the Swedish Media Conversion Centre. The newspaper *Aftonbladet*, founded in 1830, was one of the key titles in nineteenth century Sweden. It is often described as the first modern newspaper – consequently, it was also the first newspaper to be completely digitized by the National Library. Then again, if a telegraph struck by lightning in the late 1840s produced some real uncanny results, the same can be said of present day digitization processes. Introduction

Abstract: This chapter outlines the conceptual framework of the book and the variety of viewpoints related to the use of the notion of scale and zooming in digital history and humanities. The contributions included in the volume encompass different degrees of theoretical assumptions, practical insights and middle-ground reflections, symbolically expressed through the three conceptual levels: *bird's-eye view*, *overhead view* and *ground view*. Note: This book is the result of a *thinking grant* awarded in 2019 by the C²DH to the first editor. The initial project included a call for papers, launched in October 2021, and a cross-reviewing workshop, which was held at the C²DH and online in June 2022 so that the authors could come together to collectively discuss the selected proposals. Adapting the Optics: Zoom-in, Zoom-out, and Zoom-zero Modes to Understand Religious Sculptures

Abstract: This paper is devoted to the significance of the scale and physical dimensions of cultural heritage objects for their study and reuse in virtual environments. The paper focuses on digitization and virtual representation of religious sculptures from the Perm Art Gallery. The gallery's collection includes wooden sculptures of gods and saints, various decorations from churches, and a large carved iconostasis in the late baroque style, which is 25 meters high. The paper focuses on the analysis of mediation through Zoom-in, Zoom-out and Zoom-zero modes for the study of cultural heritage by objects recontextualization and reconstruction of these contexts and addresses the issue of authenticity of digitized heritage. The conclusion discusses the optics of the objects' representations as well as the limitations and benefits to variate the scales and coordinates.

Adaption of optics is an important component of successfully carrying out complex research. The ability to get closer to see the details and move away at a maximum distance provides a complete picture of the phenomenon under study. Regarding cultural heritage, digitization predefines quality of data for the subsequent use and performs as a core-pillar in high grade digital representation.

Scale Exercises: Listening to the Sonic Diversity in 5000 hours of Swedish Radio with Computers and Ears

Abstract: This article explores the significance of scale within the field of audio analysis. The introduction of digital signal processing methods is today enabling large-scale processing of recorded sound, which in turn provides access to vast amounts of unexplored audiovisual data. It is now possible to zoom the sounds of our past. In order to highlight both affordances and limitations of these new methods, this article studies 5000 hours of Swedish radio from the 1980s. By adopting computational tools from bioacoustics, linguistics and musicology it becomes possible to study trends and developments in the acoustic style of broadcasting. This provides insight into the changing characteristics of public service media in the era of de-monopolization. However, to achieve these insights, the historian needs to practice the sonic scales.

However, based on this material, it is not possible to say anything about the general character of the individual radio channels, nor about any specific aspect of content (Åberg 1996: 17).

This rather pessimistic note concludes a methodological summary written by the Swedish media scholar Carin Åberg 1996. Her ideas, though radical, have remained on the periphery of media studies ever since. She was running up against a problem of scale. Inspired by the work of German radio scholar Detlef Schröter, Åberg wanted to approach the medium, not like an information channel, but as a matter of design. Radio was simply the total sum of sounds that people wanted to hear. This meant that radio had to be studied beyond the textual and discursive realm, as “sound in time” (Åberg 1999). However, studying the actual flow of radio sounds quickly revealed itself to be a very laborious and difficult task. Manual coding was not only time-consuming, it also posed issues of precision. This led Åberg to conclude that “there just aren't any tools available for sound analysis this date. Visual and textual media rules not only science, but society at large –

Text, Fractal Dust and Informational Granularity: A Study of Scale

Abstract: This chapter proposes a method of text analysis that combines conceptual aspects from the model of scalable or zoomable text (z-text), topic modelling and fractal geometry. It argues that this type of methodology may assist in detecting different levels of generality and specificity in texts and reveal some characteristics of the assemblage of blocks of text, above the word level, at different scales of representation. Applications of such an approach can range from hermeneutics and discourse analysis to text (and possibly z-text) generation and summarization.

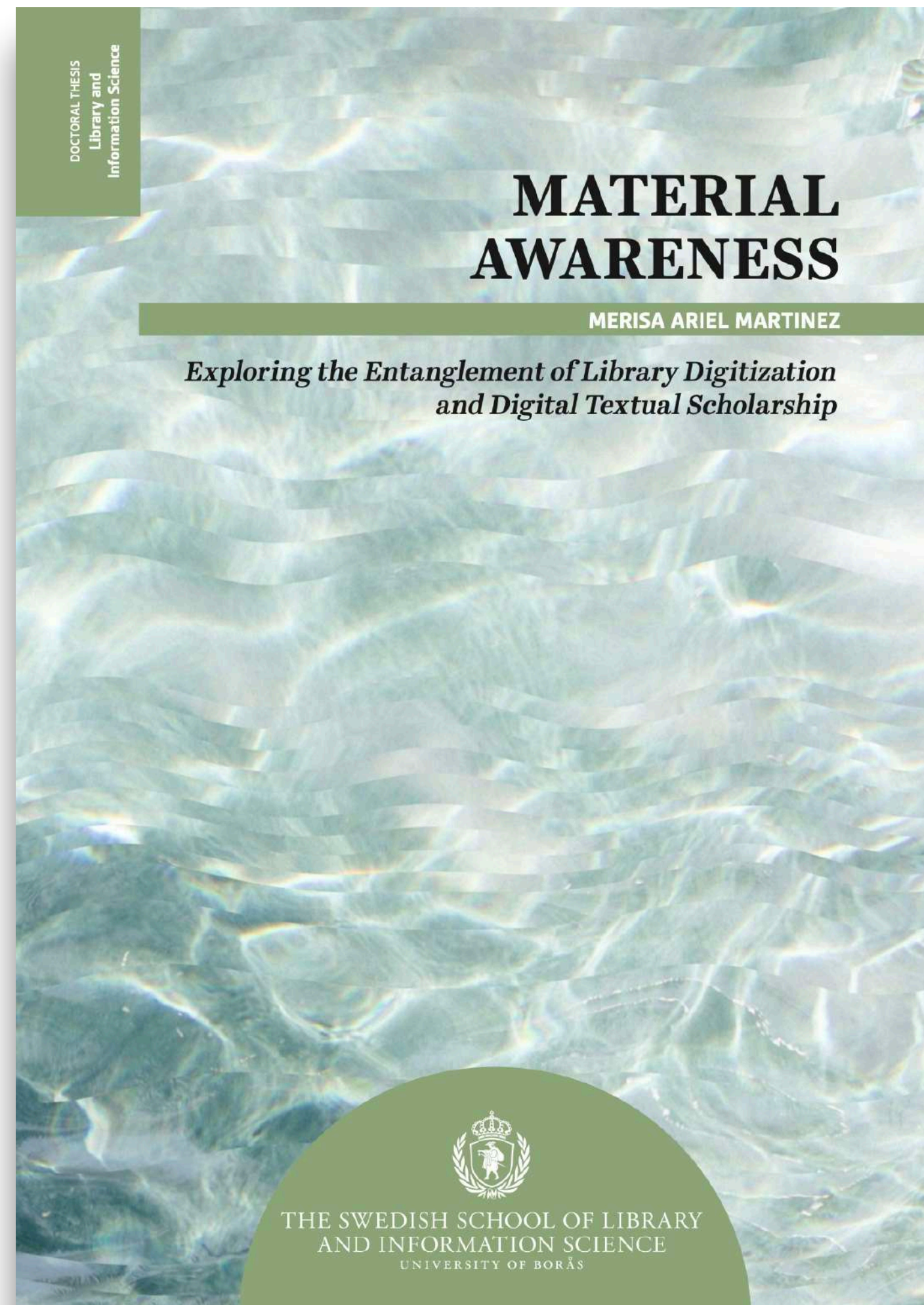
Scale in text analysis has often been considered in relation to big collections of data and the possibility offered by digital methods and tools to provide insights into patterns, trends, outliers and linguistic phenomena that are hard to detect and cover by human reading alone. Several terms, such as *distant reading*, sometimes opposed or compared to *close reading* (Moretti 2013; Underwood 2019), *scalable reading* (Mueller 2014), *macroscope* (Hitchcock 2014) and *long zoom* (Johnson 2007), have been coined to define this type of approach that allows for shifts from a bird's eye view to individual details. However, what seems to have been less studied so far is the significance of the concept of scale and its possible applications as an inherent feature of text itself. 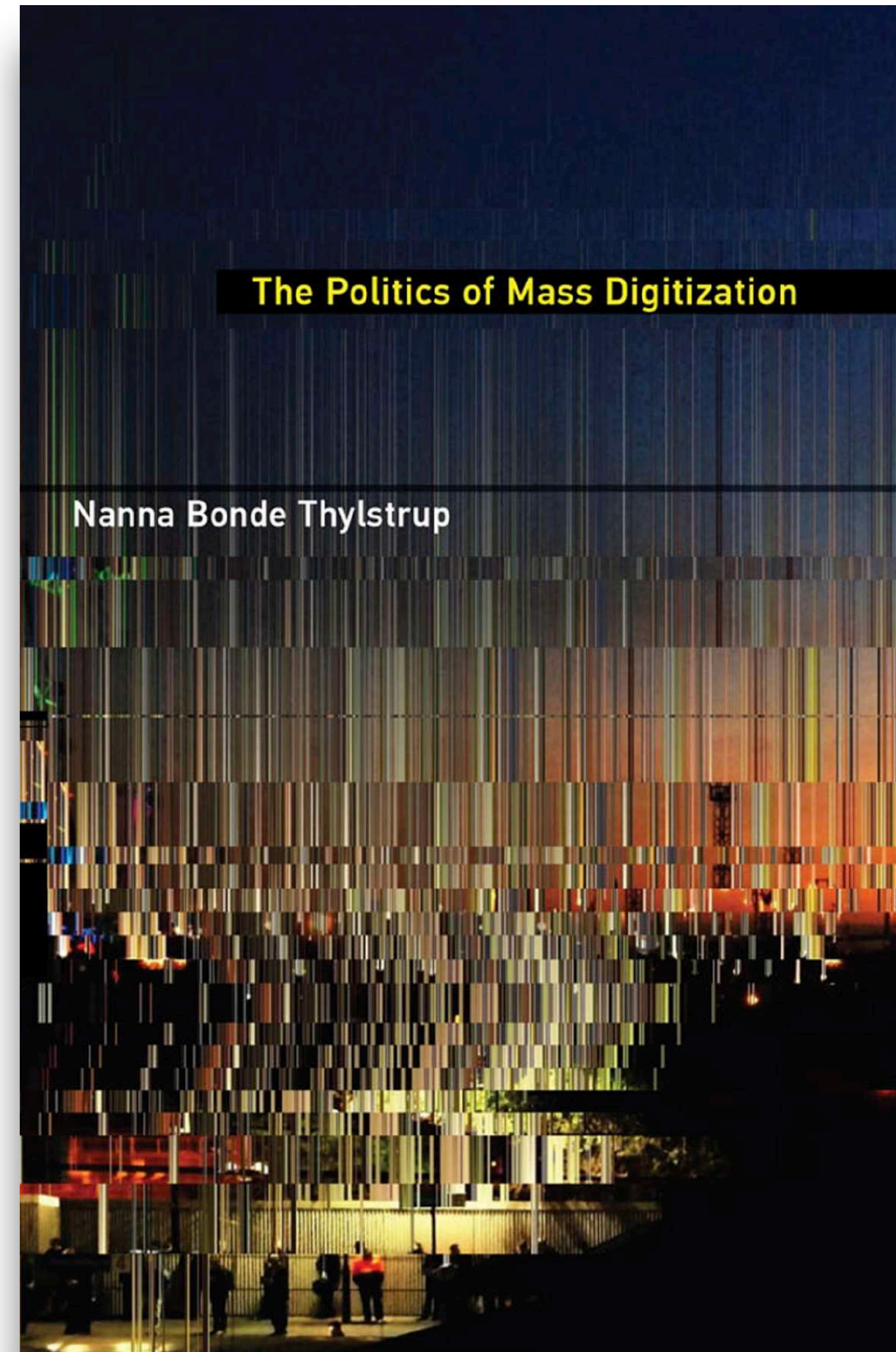

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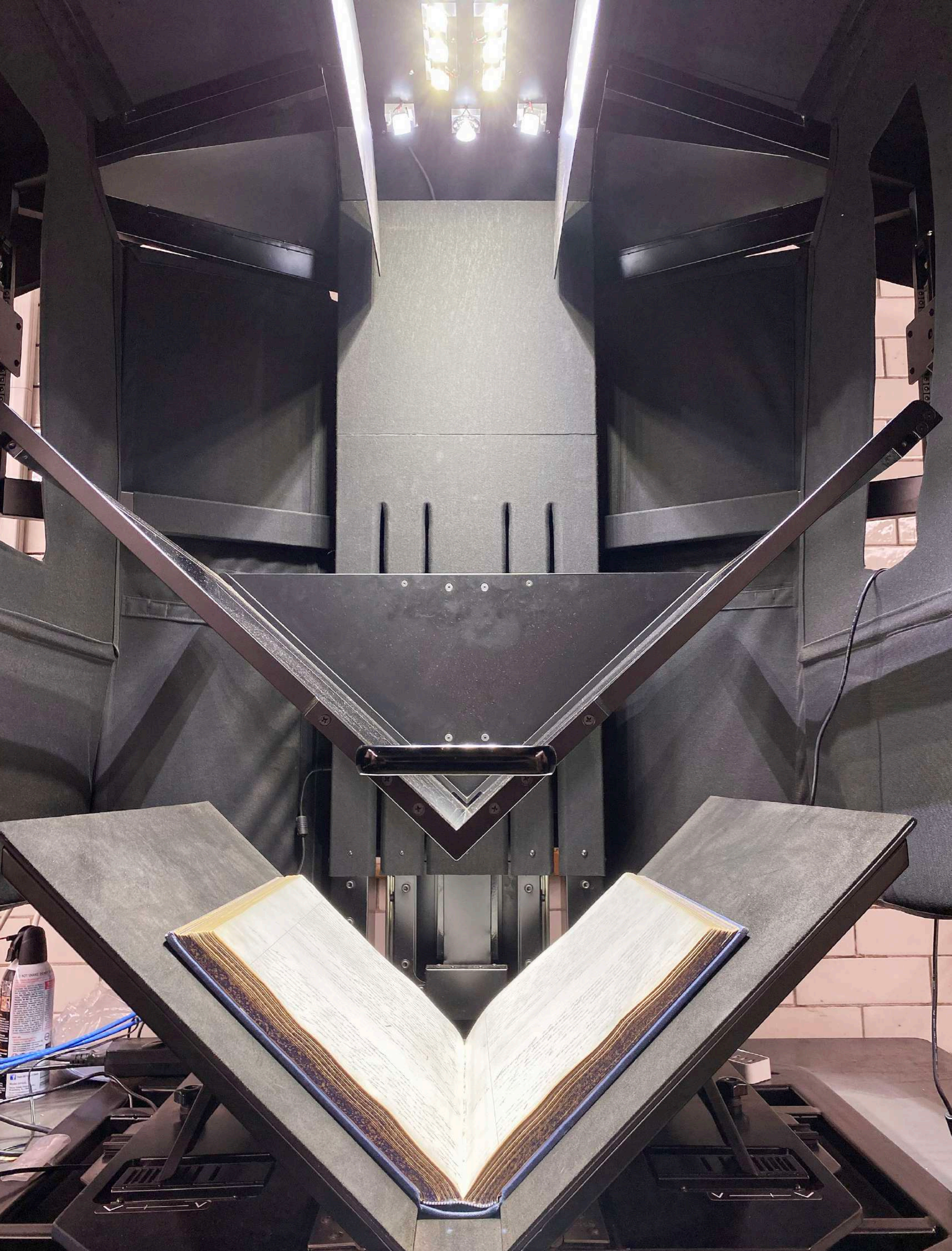

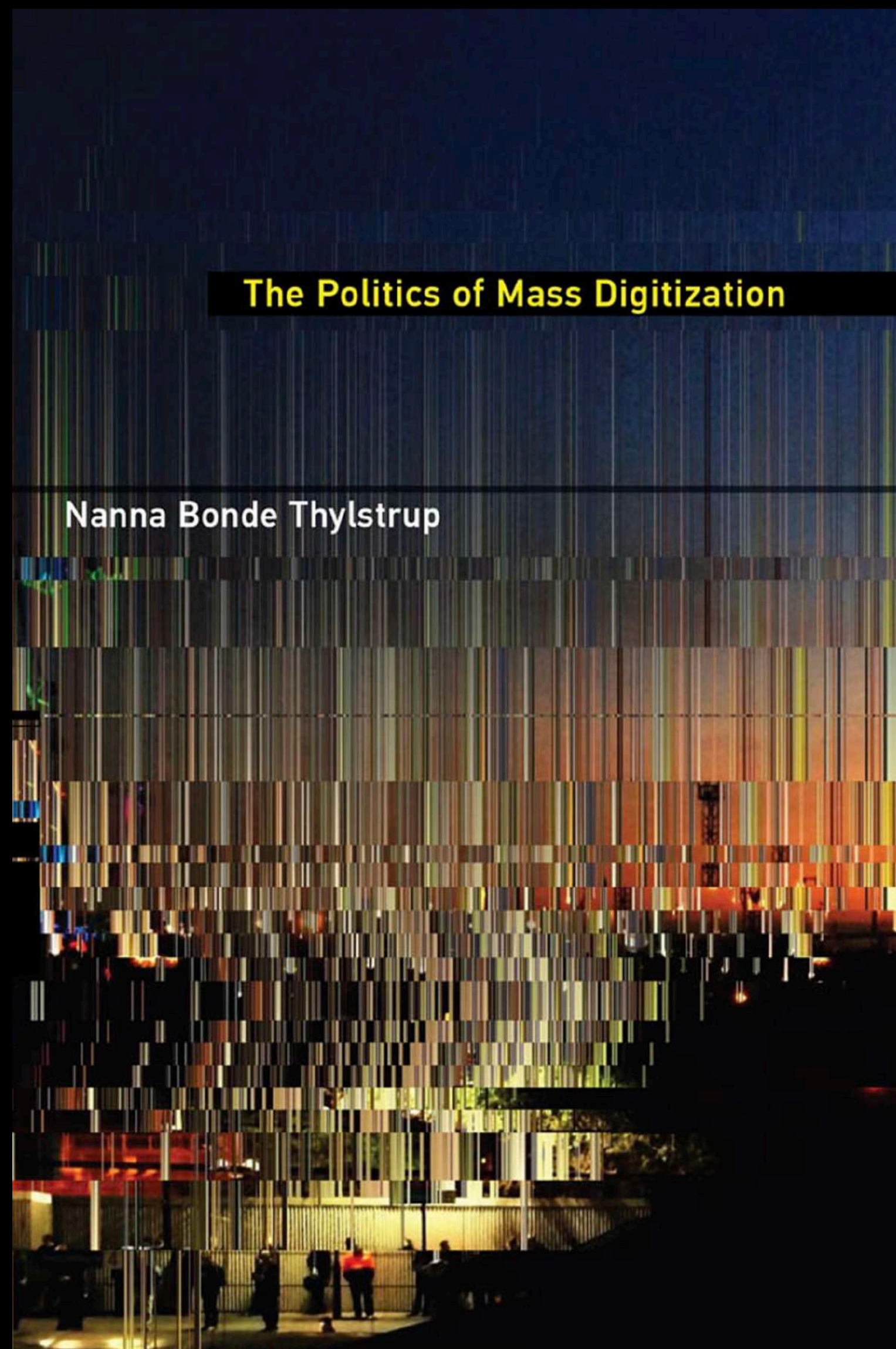
An archive is a repository – that is, a place or space in which materials of historic interest or social significance are stored and ordered. A national archive is the storing and ordering place of the collective memory of that nation or people(s). This article provides a brief historical/theoretical introduction to the politics of the archive in late capitalist societies and discusses this politics of memory via the performance of ordinary daily activities of librarians and archivists.

Some relevant political/discursive questions include: who controls, establishes and maintains the archive, and how do they do so? Which materials are preserved in the archive and which are excluded? 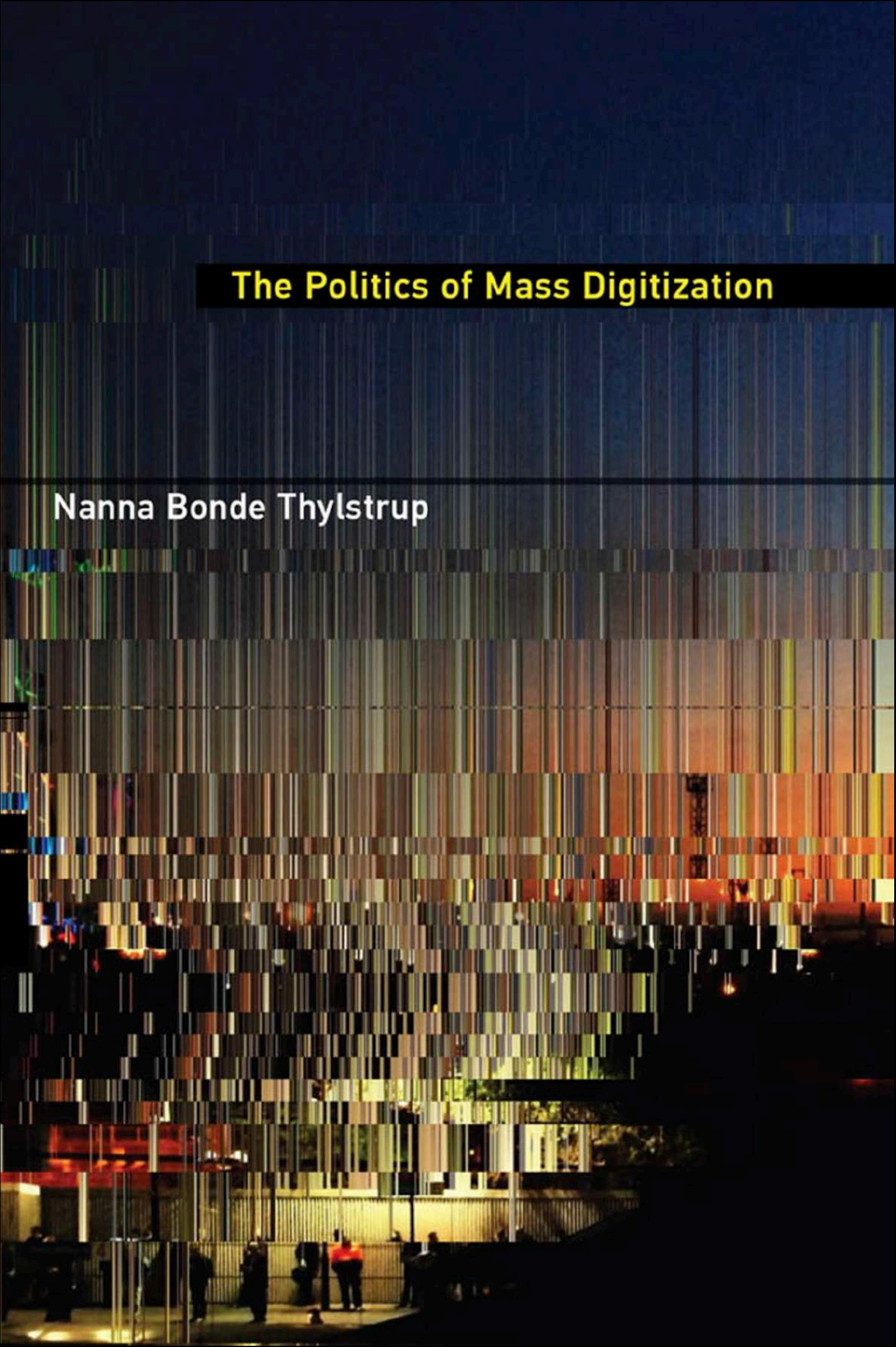

From the [beginning of Google at the Stanford Digital Libraries Initiative](#) in 1996 Larry Page and Sergey Brin wanted to build a searchable digital library of the world's books, but put the project on hold in order to launch Google's web search.

In 2002 Larry Page returned to the project of digitizing the world's books and making them

searchable. To do that he asked [Marissa Mayer](#)[↗], Google employee no. 20 and Goggle's first female engineer, to help test the idea by turning pages to the beat of a metronome as he snapped digital photos. It took him 40 minutes to photograph all the pages of a 300-page book.

To research the project Page and a small team visited other book digitizing projects, including one at his alma mater, the University of Michigan. There the staff estimated that it would take 1000 years to scan all seven million books in the university library; Page estimated that he could do in it six years.

Page then hired a robotics company to build an automatic scanner that could handle books with fragile pages, and programmers at Google created a page-recognition program that could recognize the widest range of typefaces of various sizes in 430 different languages.

After discussions with several university libraries, Oxford University became the first institution to allow Google to scan their one million nineteenth century books over a three year period.

A tentative plan from each partner displays **a complementary bouquet of initiatives**, each tailored to different scientific needs, drastically increasing the direct benefit of SwePrint to a wide range of scientific inquiries. LUB is specialized in the digitization of **print prior to 1750**, serving a research community demanding easier access to older print; at GUB the plan is to digitize **Swedish dramatic literature from the late 19th century**, a collection that consists of approximately 4,000 plays and dramatic writings; SUB will focus on materials within the **natural sciences from the end of the 19th century**; at UmUB the idea is to digitize state and royal publications (the so-called SOT- and SFS-collections) consisting of printed proclamations, and public announcements (issued on a central, regional, or local level)—but also print with propaganda, news, and prayers; and, finally, at UUB, plans are to digitize copyright-free, uncatalogued **small print from the late 19th and early 20th century**, a material that is currently more or less invisible in catalogs and hence underutilized in research.

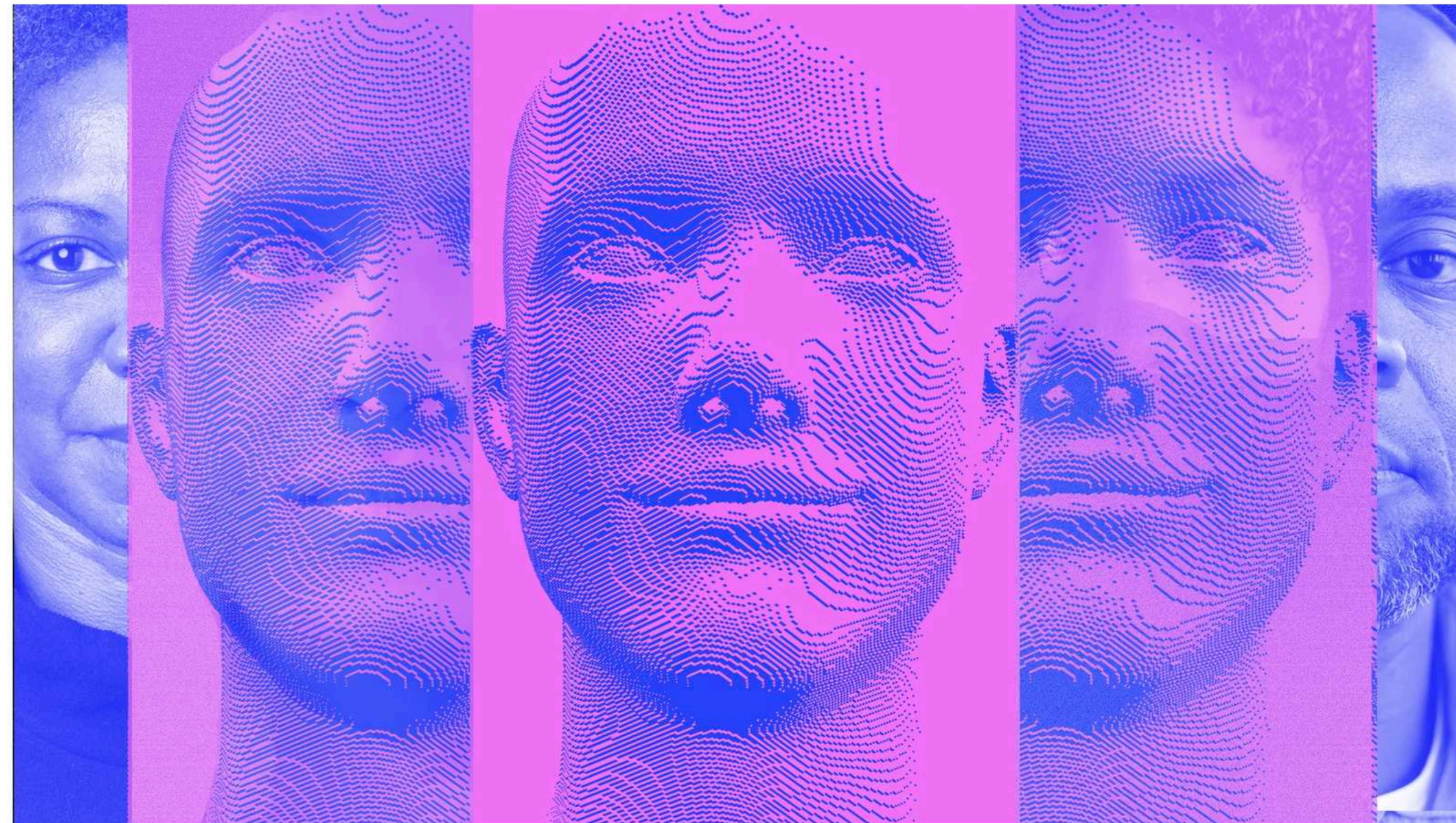
